Freedom of Information Act 2000

The Meeting was sent a model scheme to submit which Ian returned at the end of December and was approved. A copy is in the Minutes book. Ian outlined the documents which are available to view. Nicky Street proposed

adopting the scheme and it was seconded by Joyce Hughes.

Neighbourhood Watch (NW)

Our Community Police Officer John Wyeth was not available and instead we had Barry Strange, the Salisbury Divisional Neighbourhood Watch Liaison Officer. Ian Fisher explained that the list held by Mr Strange dated back to when the NW scheme was set up in 1988 and is now so out of date that some people had died and some had moved and that we had better start again.

Mr Strange suggested that the ideal scheme was 5-15 houses per volunteer co-ordinator. It is also a good idea to have a village co-ordinator. We can save on household insurance and Mr Strange will give us the name of the NW insurance broker. He will also let us have leaflets to distribute around the village. Wilton Division of NW, which is our division, produce a Newsletter every 2 months which can be sent to co-ordinators by post or, preferably, email. The man to contact there is Bob Nolton. NW signs can be obtained from Morgans of Bath for a fee. Mary Gatling said that the signs and our previous vigilance had put the word out that our village was not safe for burglars.

There is a Bobby Van available and one of its many jobs is to help make homes safer for vulnerable and elderly people at no charge. Deterrents to crime are postcode stickers, pack provided, and ultra violet pens to mark your furniture. Always be alert, take down car numbers.

Mr Strange told us that most distraction burglaries and opportunist crimes happen during daytime and that once it has happened it is more than likely that it will happen again as the word goes out.

He showed us the leaflets we will be distributing and also a variety of very noisy alarms for windows and sheds and personal safety. Mr Strange gave us a very informative hour of his time and Charles Evershed asked for a vote of thanks.
